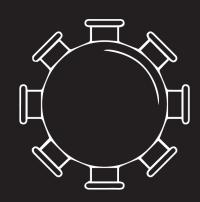

### PROVIDING QUALITY PHC SERVICES TO UNDERSERVED AND VULNERABLE POPULATION IN NIGERIA AND AFRICA

he Lown Community Health Center (LCHC), named after our benefactor, Prof Bernard Lown ((1921-2021), a physician, Cardiologist and Nobel Peace Prive recipient was conceived by Scholars from the Lown Scholar Program of Harvard School of Public Health. The LCHC, Ganmo/Amoyo, Kwara State Nigeria was founded and incorporated in Nigeria in 2019. The main concept is to establish a Primary Health Care (PHC) center as a social business. The innovation has 4 cardinal strategies with the potential to complement and improve the current PHC delivery system in Nigeria and Africa: social enterprise, improved quality PHC delivery to mothers, children and the elderly, micro-insurance scheme and deployment a state-of-the-art health management information system called Swasth Live that monitors the quality of care, health outcomes and finances of our operations. Since 2019, we operated our clinics in suburban communities of the Capital city of Kwara state, we targeted poor and underserved populations, mostly women, children and the elderly. As a not-for-profit organization, our clinics establish a micro-insurance scheme with a highly subsidized cost that is affordable for both microinsurance and out-of-pocket enrollees. We penetrated the underserved communities using structured home-based care for the poor and

underserved populations of the elderly, women and children. We establish a simple and culturally adaptable community mobilization strategy for Blood Pressure (BP) awareness and linkage to care. Collaborating with other partners and philanthropists, we have carried out countless community outreaches, saving hundreds of lives and preventing complications from some diseases. By erecting "Lown BP Stands" in the community, we have made digital BP monitoring devices available and accessible to individuals in the community thereby removing the health facility bureaucracies and complexities. This ensured community ownership and the community taking responsibility for their health. The government cannot do it all nor do it alone. By giving back to the community through private and not-for-profit organizations, the burden of providing healthcare services will be reduced among vulnerable and underserved populations while wellness and healthy living will improve especially among the neglected, vulnerable and underserved populations who are mostly women and children.

She is presently serving as an auditor on the exco of Calabar province.

# PEACEFUL AND INCLUSIVE SOCIETIES FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

ustainability is central to development discourse as we aspire for peaceful and inclusive societies. The United Nations (UN) has proposed a development agenda to ensure the sustainability of our planet, the so-called Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). The SDGs are "a shared blueprint for peace and prosperity for the people and the planet." But what does it mean to Africa?

Africa provides the raw materials that sustain global industries at the cost of the sustainability of its people. According to the Institute for Security Studies, in 2021, 2.6 million people were displaced in sub-Saharan Africa alone due to climate-related disasters. Yet, Africa is notoriously known for its political unrest and condemned harshly for its inability to provide for its people. The time has come that we hold ourselves accountable - it is the only path forward. Our oldest nations are about half a century old. Although young compared to the industrial world that has existed for centuries, our governments did not start as tabula rasa after independence. Our starting position in the world economy is that of the providers of raw materials when large profits are gained at the end of the manufacturing chain. We could despair, but progress is not linear. And

the latest development trend, the SDGs are not infallible, not even when we come together as nations.

The UN launched the SDGs in 2015, and the world leaders agreed that by 2030 the world would have achieved all 17 SDGs. One of the key goals is SDG 16:" Promote

peaceful and inclusive societies for sustainable development, provide access to justice for all, and build effective, accountable, and inclusive institutions at all levels." The SDGs are part of the resolution adopted by the General Assembly in July 2017. Yet, five years later, the Ukraine war started, and after one year is still ongoing. Sending the world a clear message: living in peace is a universal challenge. Ukraine's war is by far the SDGs' greatest conundrum. And how is it possible that the developed nations cannot stop a war in their backyard? There are multiple ways to answer. Still, Amartya Sen makes an outstanding attempt in his book Development as Freedom, where he reveals that in the Spring of 1993, the world's leaders met in Vienna to answer the following question: "What should come first - removing poverty and misery, or guaranteeing political liberty and civil rights, for which poor people have very little use for anyway?". The choice they made is evident when we analyze our current affairs.

We live in a world where industry, including arms, finances development. Sen wisely brings to our attention that wealth and injustice are two sides of the same coin. Is a sustainable and peaceful world possible? I guess the answer lies at the individual level. It boils down to how long I will continue prioritizing my modern commodities higher than my beloved planet's well-being. Sustainability is possible the minute you and I hold ourselves accountable.

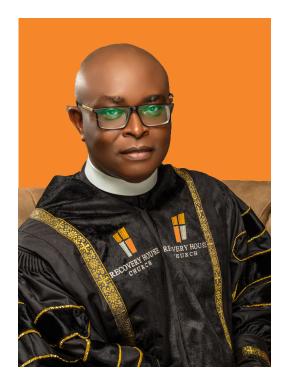

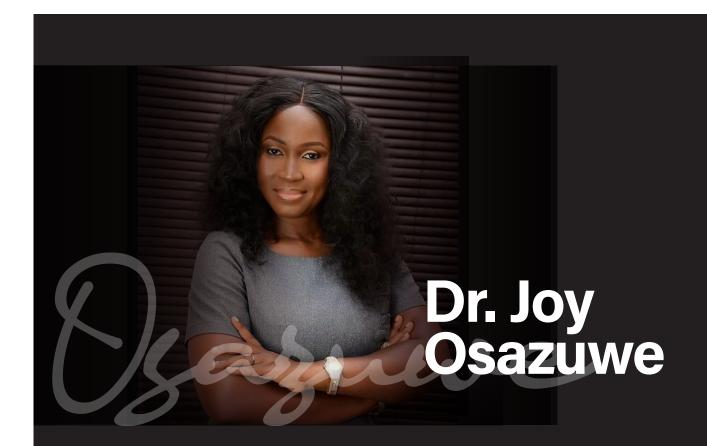

# COMPUTER PROGRAMMING FOR THE AFRICAN CHILD: THE JAHLICS STORY AND THE ROLE OF MOTHERS

n 2020, while the pandemic ravaged, the Africa tech ecosystem was thrown into a bubble by Stripe's \$200 million acquisition of Paystack. This was done in a Series-B funding deal. The story is that a less than 10 years old Software company, operating in Nigeria, with founders below the age of 35, had attained the status of a unicorn. In an interview, one of the cofounders, Shola Akinlade, revealed that the pair had to code the first version of the company's codebase from their dorm room back in the university. This was made possible by an early exposure to core concepts of computer programming. A skill they had both acquired as teenagers. Coding skills is one that millions of African children, especially the girl-child lack and are in dare need of if the continent hopes to catch up with the rest of the world technologically.

As technology continues to replace human jobs, the future of work changes drastically, newer job roles require a vast knowledge of computing skills by an individual in other to fit into these roles. To compete favorably in the international marketplace in the nearest future, the gap in computing knowledge by future generations of Africans need to be filled. The question then poses itself, what can the continent do to replicate the success of entrepreneurs like the paystack duo and attract even more foreign investments? A key to filling this gap is placing more

emphasis on empowering the girl-child through tech as the gains of programming knowledge favors female children more. Presently there are few women in the tech ecosystem, the reason for this boils down to several gender factors and present debates on equal work opportunities, yet with the right and timely engagement of the girlchild in tech by stakeholders in the industry, the girl child will begin to see the need to participate fully in programming at an early stage. Lots of established women in tech, though in the minority, continue to provided support for younger women in tech by establishing communities such as: Women in Tech, Women in AI, She Code Africa, and Women in DevC to properly guide and tutor teenagers and young women on their programming journeys. With a lesser entry barrier in contrast to other job roles, and a community that rewards female participation, Programming, by its nature, is a comfortable and less time consuming job for the female folk, especially here in Africa where a lot is expected of the girl-child at the home front. Remote jobs, freelancing, independent contracts, online tutoring, etc. are a few available jobs in tech that women can leverage upon from the comfort of their homes while fulfilling other womanly duties.

As a young girl or lady just starting out in tech, one really do not have to worry about getting a job after training, jobs are already available in the waiting. . . . . . . . . .

Funmilayo Ransome-Kuti once reminded Nigeria that women's progress isn't measured by those who drink tea in comfort, but by those who carry babies to the farm and still work until sunset.

A lot is happening in our society today. We are glad to see more women stepping into power, and women's empowerment growing daily. But the truth is this: the percentage of empowered women is still very small compared to the kind of transformation we are contending for. The best transformation a nation can have is societal transformation. A group of families makes up a community. Communities form societies, societies form states, and states form a nation. We all know the saying, "The family is the basic unit of society." It is the seed of our society and our nation, Nigeria. The kind of nation we want depends on the kind of families we intentionally (or even unconsciously) plant and nurture. A family where female empowerment is not valued, or where male character development is ignored, will eventually produce a society with deep cracks.

Funmilayo Ransome-Kuti cried out that the struggles of the majority: women who worked long hours, carried babies to the farm, and barely made ends meet, show how far Nigeria still is from true liberation. She warned that we have not truly advanced in women's rights until the rural and common woman is free from hardship and inequality. These women, she said, are the backbone of our economy because they are the most in number and they carry the greatest burden of society.

Today, times have changed. We may not see as many women carrying pans to the farm with babies strapped to their backs, but we still have countless capable and complete women living in a different kind of slavery.

It's called media slavery. Too many are caged by the chains of endless scrolling, TikTok trends, and social media addictions. This has weakened our creativity, damaged our focus, and kept the percentage of well-developed and truly empowered women low. If we want to be truly free and developed as

a country, we must be intentional about equipping and building our little units. Your little units are your friends, your family, your colleagues, your contacts, your community. Everyone in your circle matters. No one should be left out of total transformation; mentally, emotionally, and socially.

Imagine if every woman stood with one voice and one heart, just like the Abeokuta Women's Union (AWU) led by Funmilayo Ransome-Kuti in the 1940s. Those women fought tirelessly for their rights until they won. Our fight today may not be against colonial taxes or local rulers, but we must contend for the hearts and minds of our children and the next generation growing under our roofs. We must be intentional about what they consume, guiding them towards rightful and educative exposure instead of harmful and perverse content. We must teach them to return to their books, sharpen their minds, and use their creativity instead of letting it wither under the weight of screen dependence and social media obsession.

#### The Miracle Continues: How a Nigerian NGO is Taking on Global Hunger

Lagos, Nigeria — In a world where global hunger figures remain staggeringly high, one Nigerian organization is expanding its mission to feed the hungry, one meal at a time. The Jesus' Kitchen Free Feeding Pantry, a non-governmental organization founded by Pastor Edwin George Okor of the Recovery House Church, is celebrating its founder's 60th birthday by moving into a new phase of its mission. For over a decade, Jesus' Kitchen operated a breakfast pantry in Lagos, consistently feeding approximately 80 people daily. #### A Global Crisis, A Local Solution

The decision to scale up operations comes at a critical time. Recent global statistics paint a grim picture of food insecurity:

Over 670 million people faced hunger globally in 2024, a figure that has risen by 152 million since 2019. Acute food insecurity affects over 295 million people in 53 countries, a number that has increased for five consecutive years. Catastrophic hunger has more than doubled in 2024, with nearly 2 million people facing extreme levels of food insecurity, often a precursor to famine. Regional disparities are stark, with Africa accounting for one in five people who face hunger worldwide.

These sobering statistics underscore the urgent need for interventions at every level

of society. Jesus' Kitchen believes that while the problem is global, the solution often starts with local action and strategic partnerships.

#### The Power of Partnership

Pastor Edwin Okor, who also serves as the Deputy Managing Director of OAS Helicopters, draws a parallel to the biblical story of Jesus feeding the 5,000. Just as a little boy's five loaves and two fish were multiplied to perform a miracle, Jesus' Kitchen has long relied on the generosity of partners. Past collaborators have included major corporations like Flour Mills of Nigeria Dufil Prima foods Plc (Makers of Indomie Noodles) OAS Helicopters, HoneySweet Bakery, as well as local businesses and The Recovery House Church itself. To fuel its expansion, Jesus' Kitchen is now calling for a new wave of support. They are seeking partnerships with:

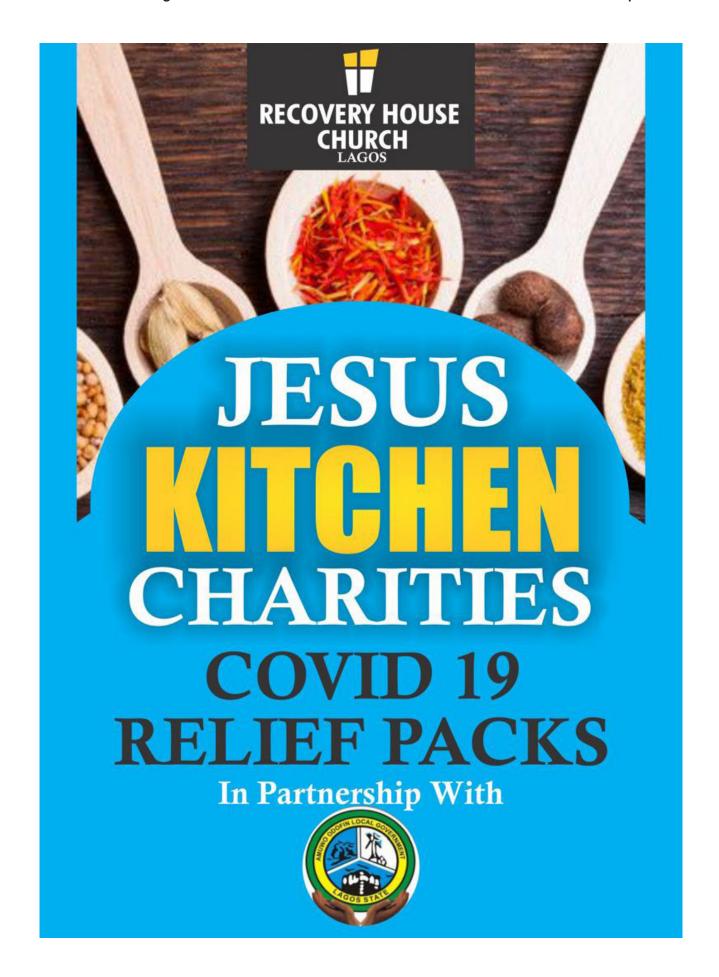














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### Dr. Zanna Hassan Boguma, FCIPDM, FWIP
